Why use it?



Turn "awful" meetings into productive meetings using best practices in collaborative problem solving

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What does it do?

- Pulls out everyone's ideas on a topic
- Helps us understand what each person meant
- Looks for similarities from which to develop themes
- Explores and prioritizes ideas
- Generates a well thought-through solution

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A five-step process

- 1. Create a focus question
- 2. Brainstorm
 - Individually
 - In groups
- 3. Cluster the ideas
- 4. Name each cluster
- 5. Commit to next steps



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Running a Solutions Meeting

- 1. Say why this topic is important to the group at this time
- 2. Briefly describe the Solutions Meeting process
- 3. Name the topic
- 4. Name the product
- 5. Say how the product will be used

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Running a Solutions Meeting (continued)

- 6. Clarify the allotment of time
- 7. Spell out the assumptions behind the method

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- 8. Delineate your role as facilitator
- 9. Highlight the focus question. . . And get to work!


Today's process


- 4 minutes of individual brainstorming
- 8 minutes of collaboration in groups
- Collect and cluster the responses
- Name the clusters (sub-team)
- Reflect on the learning
- After the meeting Dave will post the results on the CEON web site
